Mineral products are essential components for the green transition, the transition to a low carbon future, cell phones, cars, energy towers, solar panels, wind turbines, fertilizers, machinery and construction.

The previous versions of the RPS recognised and provided for the extractive and mining industry in Otago. The proposed RPS fails to recognise and provide for the extractive industries and is a significant omission. As a consequence, it will impact any future full Water Plan reviews; as the absence of any supporting policies in the RPS will direct the Schedule 1 process to not recognise or provide for mineral extraction in the lower order policy framework.

There is no rationale to exclude any recognition of the extractive industry in Otago. Competing objectives and policies in the NPSFM, PRPS and RP:W will continue to provide certainty to ensure adverse effects are appropriately considered in the consenting process.

The PRPS should set the higher order framework where the RP:W and relevant District Plans provide objectives, policies and rules as a local level. The PRPS is adopting a paternalistic position where these lower order plans are effectively directed to adopt an antimining mindset irrespective of the effects.

A recent example highlights the problem where the PRPS is silent on the mining industry is shown in the recent consent application publicly notified by the Central Otago District Council by Foothills Mining Ltd (RC210111). The Otago Regional Council lodged an opposing submission to the CODC component sighting the proposal "is inconsistent with the

objectives and policies of the RPS 19 and the Proposed Otago Regional Policy Statement 2021".

It is not accepted the proposal is inconsistent with the RPS19, and of course the proposal is inconsistent with the PRPS2021 because any objectives and policies recognising and providing for the extractive industry have been excluded from the PRPS. This will create significant uncertainty to the viability and success for a number of regionally significant projects in Otago which is at odds with the intent of Part 2 of the Act.

The removal of the existing objectives and policies in the current and previous RPS will remove any consenting pathway for the extractive and minerals industries to carry out their activities. This will force all miners to carry out extensive science reporting, including small scale hobby (NZPAM Tier 2) miners who simply do not have the resources to fund river-specific ecological investigations.

Proposed Relief

That the following objective and policies are incorporated into the PRPS.

Objective X.1

The use of water and land is recognised as an enabler of mineral extraction and the economic, social and cultural well-being of the region.

Policy X.X.1

Manage activities in rural areas and support the region's economy and communities, by:

- a) Enabling primary production and other rural activities that support that production;
- b) Providing for mineral exploration, extraction and processing.

Policy X.X.2

To recognise the functional needs of mineral exploration, extraction and processing activities to locate where the resource exists.

Policy X.X.3

Manage adverse effects from the exploration, extraction and processing of minerals, by:

- a) Giving preference to avoiding their location in the following:
 - i. Areas of significant indigenous vegetation;
 - ii. Outstanding natural character in the coastal environment;
 - iii. Outstanding natural features and natural landscapes;
 - iv. Areas of significant indigenous vegetation and significant habitats of indigenous fauna;
 - v. Outstanding natural character
 - vi. Outstanding natural features and landscapes;
 - vii. Outstanding water bodies or wetlands;
 - viii. Places or areas containing historic heritage of regional or national significance where the effects on that historic heritage cannot be avoided;
- b) Where it is not practicable to avoid locating in the areas listed in a) above due to the functional needs of that activity, the activity shall:
 - i. Avoid, remedy or mitigate, as necessary, to minimise adverse effects on values in order to maintain the outstanding or significant nature,
 - ii. Consider first biological diversity offsetting, and then biological diversity compensation for residual adverse effects,
 - iii. Reducing unavoidable adverse effects by staging development for longer term activities and progressively rehabilitating the site, where practicable.
