Range:

Uses all habitats where there is dense cover to retreat to. Translocated to islands in Whakatipu Waimāori / Lake Wakatipu and Lake Wānaka, and to Motatapu Station, where they may no longer remain. This subspecies went extinct on the mainland but survives through birds liberated on Rēkohu / Wharekauri / Chatham Islands.

Mou Waho

New Zealand endemic

A large dappled brown rail with a pinkish bill and legs, grey throat and red eye. Can be secretive, or extremely tame around well-trafficked areas. Loud 'coo-eet' calls give away its presence, particularly around dawn and dusk.
