## **Topic 1: Are we focusing on the right things in the plan?**

#### Tell us more:

One of the main ways to build trust is for the service to be reliable.

During school terms the 1c bus to Warrington is consistently late first thing in the morning. I spoke to some school children, and they get in trouble because they are late. But they are not late - I've seen them waiting at the stop at the correct times for 20-30 mins. This is how late the bus often is. This is unreliable and the opposite of building trust.

Adults catch this bus too, as it is the only one that actually comes in to Warrington. These adults are late for work as a result, and miss their connecting buses.

I could catch the bus to work myself but do not because:

- 1. It is consistently late.
- 2. The only option home in the evening is a 6pm bus, which is also consistently late, and does not come into Warrington (a long cold wait in town plus a 35 min walk on an unlit road into the village is the only option).

This is not a good, reliable or looking-after-people service.

## Topic 2: Should we support community transport services in smaller towns and rural areas?

**Our proposal:** we are considering the establishment of a subsidised community transport programme providing support for transport services in Otago's smaller towns and rural areas.

## **Topic 3: Should we increase our passenger fares?**

Our proposal: we are considering increasing the base fare for adult Bee Card passengers from \$2 to \$2.50. This would effectively increase bus fares for all passengers using Bee Cards by 25%. What do you think about this proposal?

## **Topic 4: Should we charge more for longer trips?**

**Our proposal:** we are considering introducing a zone fare system to our bus networks in Dunedin and Queenstown. Under this system, passengers travelling further distances across multiple zones will pay a higher fare than those travelling short distances within one zone. **What do you think about this proposal?**

## Topic 5: Should we keep our free fares for children (5-12 years)?

#### Our proposal:

- A. Retain free fares (100% discount) for children (5-12 years), AND
- B. Standardise our concession discount for youth (13-18 years) to 40% across both the Dunedin and Queenstown networks. For example, if the adult fare is \$2, youth pay \$1.20, or if the adult fare is \$2.50, youth pay \$1.50.
