New Zealand native

A tiny, delicate seabird with dark grey on the head and upperwings. Breast, belly and underwings are white, while the back and rump are light grey. Bill is black and very stubby; legs are long and slender. Picks planktonic barnacle larvae, a key part of its diet, off the water's surface on the fly. Call is a repetitive, wheezy 'chirp'.
