Nests under native forest along coast and on islands around the upper North Island. Common in waters off Aotearoa New Zealand, and throughout Te Tai-o-Rēhua / Tasman Sea.





Key Otago sites:

- Otago canyons, particularly in spring
- Rarely seen inshore

New Zealand endemic

A large, sleek petrel with dark grey-brown plumage and a pale face. Its heavy, stout bill is black with a sharp hook at the tip. Underwing appears reflective in strong light. Can dive as deep as 20 metres. Very active at night, with birds calling, displaying and prospecting for burrows. Call is reminiscent of a squeaky wheel.
