Breeds inland on braided riverbeds, dispersing to coastal areas in late summer. Forages for invertebrates on the wing in any open habitat, including out to sea. Found across Aotearoa New Zealand but only a rare migrant to Te Ika-a-Māui / North Island.

New Zealand endemic

A small grey tern with a bright orange bill and legs, and a forked tail. Breeding adults have a solid-black cap that recedes in the off season. Juvenile birds have black bills and mottled brown back feathers. Harsh calls are given, particularly in colonies.
