



Check back regularly to view comments. suggested identifications, and to add more!

#### **Start or join iNaturalist Projects!**

Projects let you pool your observations with other people on iNaturalist. Whether you're starting a citizen science effort or keeping tabs on the bees in your neighborhood, Projects are the way to go.

#### **Ground Nesting Bees**

When you observe bees entering or leaving from holes in the ground, you can add that observation to the iNaturalist Project "Ground Nesting Bees".

#### **Ngaro Huruhuru**

When you add observations of native bees in NZ to iNaturalist, they are automatically added to the iNaturalist Project "Ngaro Huruhuru - Native Bees of New Zealand."



#### **Bees of New Zealand**

#### **Introduced bees**

Honey bees and bumble bees were introduced to NZ to pollinate. Both are social, active most of the year (less so in winter), and easy to identify.

Some introduced bees, like the Lucerne leafcutter bee, are solitary or communal often nesting in twigs or soil.





#### Native bees (Ngaro huruhuru)

New Zealand has 28 species (3 genera) of native bee, referred to as ngaro huruhuru in te reo. They are mostly solitary, active in spring and summer, and often misidentified as small flies.
