New Zealand endemic

A large grey-brown shearwater with a long bill, a wedge-shaped tail and a distinctive dark 'M' shape across its wings. Underparts and cheeks are white, while the cap, tail and tip of its bill are dark. Legs are grey and feet have pink webbing. Very active at night and can be heard crashing through the forest canopy to get to nesting burrows.
