New Zealand endemic

A striking brown-and-white patterned cuckoo with a tail that doubles its length. Rarely seen but often heard if present, giving a very loud rising screech from dense cover. Young birds have orange undersides. Parasitises the nests of whiteheads / pōpokotea, yellowheads / mohua, and brown creepers / pīpipi instead of raising its own young.
