PLANNING CONTEXT & CONSENTING REQUIREMENTS

PLANNING REQUIREMENTS

There are a range of potential regulatory requirements that may require various consents and authorisations to be obtained in order to enable the types of activities that relate to the Nature-based Solution (NbS) interventions considered in this feasibility report.

Most of these requirements stem from regulatory documents under the Resource Management Act (RMA), but other authorisations may be required under statutes such as the Wildlife Act 1953, the Building Act 2004, and the Conservation Act 1987.

A high-level overview of the regulatory instruments under the RMA that are likely to be relevant to the NbS under consideration in Te Hakapupu Pleasant River catchment is set out below. Further details about the potential consents and authorisations that would be required for the individual NbS solutions are provided later in this report.

RESOURCE MANAGEMENT ACT 1991

The Resource Management Act (RMA) is New Zealand's principal environmental statute. It sets the scene as to how the use and development of land, air and water should be managed, and a range of regulatory instruments are promulgated under the RMA, including National Policy Statements (NPS); National Environmental Standards (NES); Regional; and District Plans.

Any resource consents that are required to authorise the proposed NbS will be assessed in terms of the provisions of the Resource Management Act and the relevant regulatory instruments. The following matters are likely to be relevant for NbS in terms of the regulatory framework established under the RMA:

- The restoration and enhancement of indigenous biodiversity; wetlands; and freshwater environments.
- Managing the effects of climate change and natural hazards.
- Taking, using, damming, and diverting water.
- Introduction of planting into the beds of lakes and rivers, riparian margins, and wetlands.
- Remediation of barriers to fish passage.
- Earthworks and the associated management of sediment discharges.
- Managing contaminated land.

NATIONAL POLICY STATEMENTS

NPS are intended to provide national direction for matters of national significance which are related to achieving the sustainable management purpose of the RMA. Consent authorities are also required to have regard to any relevant national policy statement when considering an application for a resource consent. NPS do not include rules.

The policy direction set out in NPS is relevant to informing the consenting strategy for the proposed works as they inform the way in which the use and development of land, water, and other resources should be undertaken. Of the NPS currently in effect, the following are likely to be of most relevance to the NbS under consideration:

- National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management 2020 (NPS-FM)
- National Policy Statement for Indigenous Biodiversity 2023 (NPS-IB)
- National Policy Statement for Highly Productive Land 2022 (NPS-HPL)

NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL STANDARDS

National Environmental Standards (NES) are regulations made under the RMA and set out technical standards, methods or requirements relating to certain activities and their effects that apply throughout the country. They contain rules that must be complied with, and consents are required if compliance cannot be achieved. These standards do not include any policy provisions.

Of the NES currently in effect, the following are likely to be of most relevance to the NbS under consideration:

- National Environmental Standard for Assessing and Managing Contaminants in Soil to Protect Human Health 2011 (NES-CS)
- National Environmental Standards for Freshwater 2020 (NES-F)
- National Environmental Standards for Commercial Forestry 2017 (as amended in 2023) (NES-CF)
- National Environmental Standards for Sources of Human Drinking Water (NES-DW)
- Freshwater Farm Plans Regulations 2023
- Stock Exclusion Regulations 2020

A NOTE ON RESOURCE MANAGEMENT LAW REFORM

Resource management law has been subject to ongoing reform over the past few years and is continuing to face reform under the current Government. Various amendments to the RMA have already been proposed and are currently going through the parliamentary process, with further amendments yet to come. Ultimately the current Government has signalled that it will seek to repeal the RMA and replace it with a statute based on the enjoyment of private property rights. In this context, it will be important to keep abreast of legislative changes that may affect the delivery of the NbS outlined in this report.

OTHER REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS

There is the potential for the NbS to require authorisations under other legislative requirements as follows:

- A wildlife permit under the Wildlife Act 1953
- An archaeological authority to damage, destroy or modify any archaeological sites that may be unearthed during the course of any project works
- Ensuring that any instream structures meet the relevant regulatory requirements in relation to fish passage; and
- A requirement for any dams to obtain consent under the Building Act 2004.

NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS CONSENTING REQUIREMENTS

Based on a high-level assessment of the likely works associated with each NbS intervention within Te Hakapupu Pleasant River catchment, a summary of the potential consenting requirements associated with these activities under the relevant regulatory instruments is set out in the tables below.

LAND COVER MANAGEMENT
