- Otago canyons, particularly in summer and autumn
- Sometimes seen inshore



New Zealand endemic

A small, densely built seabird with a stubby bill (resembles a miniature penguin on the water). Glossy black plumage with a greenish tinge. Underside is smudged white, bill is black and feet are bright blue. Purposeful flier with short, whirring wingbeats. Catches plankton via wing-propelled diving, reaching depths of up to 60 metres. Call is a sweet, rising 'croon'.
