Topic 3: Should we increase our passenger fares?

Our proposal: we are considering increasing the base fare for adult Bee Card passengers from \$2 to \$2.50. This would effectively increase bus fares for all passengers using Bee Cards by 25%. **What do you think about this proposal?**

Tell us more:

ORC has delivered great improvements to the service in recent years which have collectively grown patronage. Key amongst these have been the flat \$2 fare. It would be really sad to see the patronage gains reversed through fare changes, especially amidst a cost of living crisis (and a climate crisis). Keeping fares low and flat delivers strong social and environmental benefits at a time when they are really needed.

Topic 4: Should we charge more for longer trips?

Our proposal: we are considering introducing a zone fare system to our bus networks in Dunedin and Queenstown. Under this system, passengers travelling further distances across multiple zones will pay a higher fare than those travelling short distances within one zone. **What do you think about this proposal?**

Should Council charge more for longer trips?



Tell us more:

As above. Flat fares support residents that are disadvantaged by distance, and incentivise use of public transport for longer distance trips, which has significant benefits for emissions reduction.

Topic 5: Should we keep our free fares for children (5-12 years)?

Our proposal:

- A. Retain free fares (100% discount) for children (5-12 years), AND
- B. Standardise our concession discount for youth (13-18 years) to 40% across both the Dunedin and Queenstown networks. For example, if the adult fare is \$2, youth pay \$1.20, or if the adult fare is \$2.50, youth pay \$1.50.

Should Council retain free fares (100% discount) for children (5-12 years)?





Tell us more:

Would also support extending the free fares for youth 13-18. This is a critical time in development of travel habits and also desire for greater personally mobility. Unlocking alternative travel options for kids also enables parents to avoid the need to drop off at schools.
